To join in with our celebrations, we also launched a family Twitter competition. Each day, 2 members of staff released clues about their favourite classic novel. Children and their families had the full week to solve the riddles and complete the entry forms in school. We had over 100 entries and our special 'Prize Spinner' had a very difficult job, picking 8 lucky winners!
